Safer Internet Day is a global campaign to promote the safe and responsible use of technology, which calls on young people, parents, carers, teachers, social workers, law enforcement, companies, policymakers, and wider, to join together in helping to create a better internet.

Using the internet safely and positively is a key message that we promote at Oakfield Infant and Junior Schools Federation, and celebrating Safer Internet Day is a great opportunity for us to re-emphasise the online safety messages we deliver throughout the year.

On Tuesday 11th February, all the children took part in an assembly discussing this year's theme: 'Free to be me, exploring identity online.' We discussed how our identities online and offline may differ because we do not want to give any personal information online. We talked about creating a positive digital footprint as what is posted online is out there forever. We explored how children manage their online identity and how the internet shapes how they think of themselves and others. Our aim is to celebrate difference and help us work towards creating a truly inclusive internet.

Throughout the week, in lessons, children continued to explore this theme and the way in which people express themselves online both positively and negatively. We discussed how everyone is allowed and encouraged to be 'Free to be me' online as long as they do it kindly and respectfully and do not stop someone else from being free.
